#### **NURSERY THIS TERM**

In Summer 1, we focused our learning on the stories "Dear Zoo," "Teeny Weeny Tadpole," and "The Very Hungry Caterpillar." We explored various zoo animals and enjoyed singing a song related to "Dear Zoo." Each child created their own animals and wrote letters to the zoo. Since pets are like friends, we encouraged the children to bring in a photo of their pets so we could talk about them.

"The Teeny Weeny Tadpole" taught us about the life cycle of a frog, and the children were thrilled to learn that it all starts with one little egg. From "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," we discussed the life cycle of a butterfly, and we were fortunate to have live caterpillars in our class. The children observed their growth and transformation through the different stages of their life cycle. This experience led us to a mini-beast hunt in the garden and field, which truly captured the children's imaginations. They were eager to share their knowledge, especially when they discovered plump worms or colourful butterflies. This led to a project called "My Minibeast Garden," which the children worked on with their parents.



The weather allowed us to enjoy our time in the garden. The children are diligently caring for the vegetables and flowers, and they are excited to watch them grow.

#### **NURSERY THIS TERM**

We are excited to announce the opening of a brand-new football pitch in our nursery garden! This will provide a wonderful opportunity for our little ones to develop their motor skills, teamwork, and enjoy outdoor play in a structured environment. A huge thank you to all our parents for their support and donations. We are also working on enhancing our outdoor classroom.



Art inspired by Gustav Klimt's "Tree of Life" is a beautiful addition to the nursery. The swirling tree branches and gentle colours create a warm and peaceful atmosphere, symbolizing growth and life—perfect for a space where children will grow and learn. The design adds a touch of nature and creativity to the nursery, and we can't wait to see you at our exhibition.



Finally we had a reading workshop in collaboration with Hillington Library was a fun and beneficial way for nursery children and their parents to enjoy books together. It fosters a love for reading from an early age and helps build strong language skills. Parents will also learn ways to make reading at home enjoyable and meaningful. It's a special time for sharing stories, learning, and growing together.

#### **RECEPTION THIS TERM**

During this exciting term in Reception, the children had the opportunity to learn about different minibeasts found in the garden and the plants that appear in the spring season. They witnessed caterpillars turning into butterflies and learned about their life cycle, as well as the life cycle of a frog in our pond. The children planted sunflowers, pumpkins and flowers in our garden area. They learned that plants need air, sunlight, warmth, water, and nutrients from the soil to grow, and studied in detail the parts of plants, including roots, stems, leaves, flowers, and petals. We made the most of the beautiful weather and spent lots of time enjoying outdoor activities, such as constructing, playing games, planting, or simply relaxing and reading by the pond.

In Maths this term, we were looking at teen numbers and explored them in depth, including tens and ones and their composition. In literacy, we have started the new approach to writing-The write stuff which will help us prepare for transition to Year 1. This means, we are now working on more complex sentences when we are writing, ensuing our letters are formed correctly so they can be read by others.



#### **Outdoor Learning**

This term, our Reception children made the most of this beautiful weather as they explored outdoors. The beautiful weather encouraged lots of water play and gardening activities. The children enjoyed building dens and obstacle courses, role playing by the fire pit and cooking mud pies.



#### **RECEPTION THIS TERM**

#### Woodwork

This term, the Reception children fully accessed the wood working workshop outdoors where they have been learning about valuable and engaging experiences offered by woodwork.

First, the children learnt about the importance of safety in the workshop before they began sawing, drilling, hammering and screwing to create various toys and products like snail houses, aeroplanes, cars, trains, buses and more. The Reception children showed great sensibility when they work with different tools as well as impressive creativity. These kinaesthetic experiences will help the children remember and learn through hands-on activities and will stay with them for along years to come.



#### **RECEPTION THIS TERM**

#### Art

The Reception children have been exploring the art of Vincent van Gogh as they looked closely at the "Sunflowers". The children used various techniques and media and created famous "Sunflowers" inspired sketches, drawings, paintings, and collages. A highlight of this project was a pottery painting. Thanks to Krisztina Heja - a Hungarian artist, who showed us how professional pottery painter works, we were able to decorate our own plates, cups, bowls and vases.

All of these creations will be available to see in the whole school Art Exhibition that will take place in first week of Summer 2.



#### **YEAR 1 THIS TERM**

Year 1 have been working exceptionally hard this half term, showing great resilience and curiosity across all subjects of the curriculum. In Maths, the children have been developing their understanding of number and have recently been learning about halves and division through sharing and grouping.

In Reading, Year 1 have been focused during every lesson, striving to become even better readers. They have been working hard to practise their phonics in preparation for the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check. Our daily phonics sessions have led to significant progress, and we read and listen to stories every day to enrich our vocabulary, immerse ourselves in fantastical worlds and become more accomplished writers.

In English, the children enjoyed baking cakes as part of their writing unit on instruction texts. They followed and wrote their own instructions carefully and had great fun tasting the final product! We also explored non-fiction writing by learning about the seasons, creating information texts with facts, headings and labelled diagrams.

In Science, we have been learning about plants, focusing on British fruit and vegetables and deciduous trees. The children particularly enjoyed going on a mini field trip around the school grounds, where they identified different types of plants and trees in their local environment. This hands-on experience helped them develop observation skills and connect their classroom learning to the world around them.

In Art, we have been studying the famous artist Vincent Van Gogh. The children have re-created some of his most well-known pictures, focusing on how to show movement through brushstrokes and colour. We are incredibly proud of their efforts and can't wait to showcase their artwork during our art exhibition next term.

In addition, we have been working hard preparing for our class assembly. The children have been learning their lines, singing songs, dancing and even making kites as part of our performance. We thoroughly enjoyed performing in front of our parents and carers, and it was wonderful to celebrate our learning together.



#### **YEAR 1 THIS TERM**

A highlight this half term was our trip to Gunnersbury Park Museum, where we explored what life was like during Victorian times. The children discovered how Victorian children lived, worked, and went to school. We visited the Rothschild House and even got to explore the beautiful park. This experience brought history learning to life in a fun and memorable way.

As their teachers, we are incredibly proud of all their achievements and look forward to celebrating even more successes next half term. Well done, Year 1!



#### YEAR 2 THIS TERM

Year 2 has accomplished a great deal this half term, despite it being a short one.

We have been enjoying weekly swimming lessons at school, where the children are gaining confidence in the water. They are learning how to kick their legs while staying afloat using a float. Additionally, they have been practicing blowing bubbles and floating on their backs. The excitement after each session is palpable, and the children can't wait to return for the next lesson. These swimming skills are essential for keeping them safe in the water.

To wrap up our Design Technology (DT) unit from last half term, we applied the skills we learned to create food for a picnic. The children made sandwiches and chocolate nests, which allowed them to practice their cutting skills while working together as a team. It was a fantastic lesson, and they significantly improved their cutting abilities and teamwork!



During our reading lessons this half term, we have focused on a non-fiction text about sports. We have been practicing our retrieval skills to better understand non-fiction materials and to easily identify key information. This practice has significantly improved our reading abilities and helped us find the necessary information to answer our questions.

In History this half term, we have been studying the Great Fire of London. We are learning about how the fire started, how it spread, and its impact on modern house construction. We sequenced the events of the Great Fire and discussed how Christopher Wren influenced architecture as a result of the fire. For our final unit, we will write about the main impacts of the Great Fire of London on present-day London, focusing on housing, street layouts, city planning, and fire safety equipment and systems. We have really enjoyed learning about this topic and how it has changed our way of life.

#### **YEAR 2 THIS TERM**

On Thursday, May 1st, we had our pedestrian training, where we practiced safely crossing the road and identifying potential dangers when walking outdoors. We discussed the Green Cross Code, which includes four key steps: Stop, Look, Listen, and Think.

Additionally, we learned to watch for three important signs when cars are nearby: no driver, no lights, and no engine noise. If all three conditions are met, it is safe for us to cross the road.

It was a great day, and the children learned a lot about staying safe both on the road and in vehicles. We also talked about the best places to cross the road, which is very important for everyone's safety!



#### **YEAR 3 THIS TERM**

What a fantastic term it's been in Year 3! The children have been busy exploring new topics, developing their skills, and having lots of fun along the way.

In Maths, we've been learning all about *fractions*. The class has done a brilliant job identifying halves, quarters, and thirds, and have been using diagrams and practical activities to show their understanding.

In English, we've let our imaginations run wild by writing our own *twisted tales*! Inspired by *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs*, the children wrote humorous versions of *Goldilocks and the Three Bears*—this time from the villain's perspective. The creativity and comedy in their stories have been a joy to read!





In Geography, we've been exploring the *water cycle* and learning about *weather patterns*. From evaporation to precipitation, the children have been busy observing, experimenting, and even creating their own water cycle diagrams.


It's been a term full of creativity, curiosity, and hands-on learning. We're so proud of all the hard work Year 3 have put in and are looking forward to more exciting learning next term!









Year 5 has had an incredibly exciting Summer term! In maths, we are finishing up the Year 5 curriculum by revisiting material we found tricky and starting to prepare for Year 6 content. In reading, we are enjoying "Percy Jackson" and making connections to our history units.

In writing, we explored dialogues and wrote a play script based on the Greek myth of Theseus and the Minotaur. You may have seen our class assembly about our history unit on the Power of Protest; we loved exploring how people throughout history have used protest to create significant change.

In science, we conducted numerous experiments on reversible and irreversible changes, which helped us understand the properties of different materials. We hope to see you at the Year 5 art exhibition, where you can view our Berlin Painter Vases.

Beyond our curriculum, we've been enjoying weekly swimming lessons and school trips. Our highlight was the trip to the London Zoo, where we explored various animals and their habitats. Additionally, our Year 5 STEM leaders presented their experiments to other schools at the Great Science Share at St. Mary's University.

#### **YEAR 6 THIS TERM**

This half term has been a busy and rewarding one, filled with both hard work and valuable learning experiences. We began with a workshop focused on how to deal with exam stress, where the children learned useful techniques to help them stay calm, focused, and confident in the lead-up to their exams. This came at just the right time, as the children then faced a challenging week of SATs. We were incredibly proud of how hard they worked, showing determination, resilience, and a positive attitude throughout. To celebrate their fantastic effort and to help them unwind, we spent a lovely afternoon at the park. It was a great opportunity for the children to enjoy some free time, have fun with their friends, and relieve some of the pressure they had felt during the exams.

Later in the term, we took part in another important workshop that focused on friendships, personal boundaries, consent, and how to stay safe online. The sessions encouraged open discussions and gave the children the opportunity to explore these themes in a supportive environment. They reflected on what it means to be a good friend, how to respect each other's boundaries, and how to navigate online spaces responsibly. Overall, it has been a term full of growth—both academically and personally—and we are proud of everything the children have achieved.

#### **Pupil Parliament**

Pupil Parliament visited the Houses of Parliament on the 30<sup>th</sup> of April 2025! They had a tour where they learned about the House of Commons and the House of Lourdes and how a Bill becomes a law (with a bit of Parliamentary Ping Pong). They also sat into a real debate in the House of Commons and even met our Harlington MP John McDonnell. They finished with a workshop about law making and went home with a future voter pin.

Our subcommittees have been working hard on their projects. The lending library committe launched their libraries in assembly and even worked hard to fill and monitor the shelves – they're planning a survey at the end of the year to see how people are enjoying them.

#### STEM Leaders Visit St Mary's University for the Great Science Share

This term, our STEM Leaders had the exciting opportunity to visit St Mary's University for the Great Science Share — a special event celebrating curiosity, creativity, and young scientists. Our group proudly presented two fascinating experiments: one exploring the colourful diffusion patterns of Skittles, and another investigating how our brains can be tricked by colour when it comes to tasting food. Both experiments were a big hit, drawing lots of interest from pupils and staff from other schools.

In addition to showcasing their own work, the children enjoyed visiting a variety of other science stalls, including fun demonstrations on liquid density. They also had the chance to observe university-level experiments and took a guided tour of the campus, sparking inspiration for future science ambitions. It was a fantastic day filled with learning, discovery, and scientific fun!

#### **Travel Ambassadors**

This term we found out that after attending Hillingdon's 'Dragon's den' workshop as part of the transport for London school initiative. Our travel ambassadors not only received £400 for their road safety project but also received an additional £50 to support them with their project! So watch this space as our resources are delivered and the travel ambassadors take part in training to become road safety superheroes and help others around the school to be safe on the road!

This term the travel ambassadors have also been busy organising 'big walk and wheel' Each class had to track how we all came to school to gain a chance of winning prizes for the school. Nationally William Byrd came 100<sup>th</sup> out of 1000 school's taking part in the initiative! So well done us!

To finish this term is national walk to school week. As part of this project the travel ambassadors have presented an assembly telling the school about all the events we have planned! These include:






#### **YOUNG ARTISTS SUMMER SHOW 2025**
