During this half term, the Nursery class has been actively engaged in the topic "Ready Steady Grow". We have been reading the story of "Jack and the Beanstalk" and have planted our own magic beans. Additionally, we have been learning about the origins of fruits and vegetables, and have made a colourful salad while planting a wide range of new flowers and vegetables in our garden. We are eagerly awaiting their growth.

Our little ones have also enjoyed listening to, retelling and acting out the story of "Oliver's Vegetables" and "The Tiny Seed". Our understanding of the plant's life cycle has helped us take good care of our flowers and vegetables. We have also learned how to blend colours and enjoyed painting pictures of the delicious fruit and vegetables.

In celebration of Mother's Day, we held a Spa Day, which turned out to be an outstanding success. Our lovely exhibition of children's artworks touched all the mothers' hearts.

We ended the term on a high note with a fantastic Easter Egg hunt. The children had a blast finding clues and solving them to get closer to their delicious treats! RECEPTION THIS TERM

Over the past half term, our Reception class has been learning about prehistoric creatures, including dinosaurs. We have been comparing their different diets, distinguishing between carnivores and herbivores by looking at their unique features. Our lessons have also covered the profession of a palaeontologist, and we've even had the chance to dig out some fossils and giant bones! Alongside this, we have created dinosaur habitats in our Small World area and made models of dinosaurs in our art area. We've also been exploring the history of cave paintings and have created our own using natural paints and self-made paintbrushes on slate and fabric.



WELLY WALK

We went on a wally walk around the school filed for our new project 'Puddles and Rainbows'. During the walk, children described the weather and spoke about the changes that happen during spring including showers and rainbows. Children were looking for signs of spring in the environment and collected different natural items found on the walk. We then experimented with waterproof materials, designed and made our own umbrellas.



RECEPTION THIS TERM

WOODWORKING STATION

The children in Reception are thrilled about the recent addition of a woodworking area in their garden. This new area provides them with numerous opportunities to saw, drill, cut and attach wooden pieces using real tools. Initially, the children were taught how to use the tools safely, and now that they are gaining confidence, they are beginning to create their own wooden creations.



POND IN EYFS GARDEN

An exciting addition that has been made to the EYFS garden is a pond. The staff and children have put in a lot of effort to create this interesting new space, which is sure to attract various forms of wildlife and inspire new learning experiences. The pond has proven to be an exciting theme for children in Reception, sparking imaginative role-playing games such as fishing and storytelling about frogs and ducks, and even inspiring singing activities. LITERACY AND MATHS SHEDS

We are extremely thankful to our friends, the Heathrow Rangers, for generously donating 4 beautiful sheds to our Early Years Foundation Stage. These sheds are a wonderful addition to our garden and are being used as excellent storage for our literacy and maths resources. This allows the children to have an independent selection and integration of reading, writing and maths in their play. We are grateful to Heathrow Rangers for their wonderful contribution!



YEAR 1 THIS TERM

In Writing we have been writing a recount about our trip to the woods. On the 29th February Year 1 went on a trip to the woods to find the Gruffalo. We travelled through the woods and we found some moss, we walked through some squelchy mud and puddles. We saw lots of tall trees and animal's habitats. At the end we finally found the Gruffalo! It was a fantastic trip and we had a great time! Over the last 2 weeks we have then wrote up our recount of our trip to the woods.



YEAR 1 THIS TERM

In Maths we have been learning all about numbers to 50. We have been counting forwards and backwards up to 50 as well as looking at 1 more and 1 less than a given number. We used number lines to place numbers up to 50 and we partitioned numbers into tens and ones. We also looked at estimating on a number line and thinking where best the numbers would fit. We used many manipulatives to represent numbers to 50 too. These included: dienes, counters, tens frames and part-whole models.

In Science we have been learning about animals including humans. We sorted animals into carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. We also had a chance to visit the school pets the Guinea pigs. Before visiting we wrote down some questions to ask about the Guinea pigs related to what we have been learning. We asked questions like what do they like to eat? Are they herbivores, carnivores or omnivores? Do they like to sleep in the day or at night? We have also been looking at the different parts of the human body and labelling them with the different organs.



In DT this term we have been looking at different vehicles and identifying the wheels, chassis and axels of them. We then tested out some vehicles to see which ones travelled the furthest. Then we made our very own cars using cardboard boxes, MDF wheels and wooden dowels. We are going to be testing them to see whose car moves the best. It was a very exciting topic and we have really enjoyed learning about different vehicles and what they need to help them move.



YEAR 2 THIS TERM

Year 2 has had an amazing term. We have learned and practiced many new skills. We have been writing narratives, reports, recounts, and debates. We had the opportunity to visit Hampton Court Palace where we explored King Henry VIII's chambers, bedrooms, chocolate kitchen, gardens, and even saw a Tudor toilet. We have been exploring our school grounds and gardens to find microhabitats, identify food chains and webs. We have even been able to explain what would happen if a food chain was disturbed. We read every day and update our Boom Readers online. Some of us are 3 week champions now! We are excited for the next half term and all the new things we are going to learn, explore, and experience.





YEAR 3 THIS TERM

Year 3 has had a busy half term! We have been reading an adventure story called 'Fortunately, the Milk'. In the story, a dad goes to the shop for some milk but takes a really long time. Upon his arrival home, he tells his children an elaborate tale of the journey he has been on to get the milk home!

In Maths, we have completed the fractions unit and moved onto measurement. We have focused on using cm and mm to measure different objects in our classroom.

In History, we have been learning all about Ancient Rome and what life was like during those times. This links to the diary entry we have been writing about Roman gladiators.

We've had great fun in PE learning a new sport - NFL flag. In DT, we have been making pneumatic monsters.

Finally, in Science, we have been learning about forces and plants. Our forces theme fit in nicely with our trip to Legoland where we learned all about the forces of rollercoasters. We even got to make our own rollercoasters out of Lego and managed to try out a few rides there too!



YEAR 4 THIS TERM

Year 4 had a busy and delightful term. We enjoyed reading two books, "Secrets of Sun King" and "Agent Zaiba Investigates". These adventure and fantasy chapter books were fun to read. "Secrets of Sun King" also helped us learn about the Ancient Egyptians in our History unit. We finished our weaving unit in DT and displayed our weavings around the classrooms; they look great! We also celebrated French Day, where we visited a French cafe in our KS2 Hall, made our own menus, and ordered in French. It was an incredible experience.




YEAR 5 THIS TERM


This half term Year 5 have enjoyed discovering about the development of a foetus in the womb as well as how we grow and develop once we are born in our Science unit 'Animals Including Humans'. We have become explorers and investigated the features, flora and fauna of different biomes in our Geography unit. We are very much looking forward to exploring this further in our trip to London Zoo after the Easter holidays! Year 5 have thoroughly enjoyed our PE unit this half term which has been NFL flag where we have developed our throwing and catching, tagging, strategic discussions and teamwork.

In Writing we have been incredibly busy, writing an adventure narrative based on the book 'The Explorer' by Katherine Rundell, a biography about the life and achievements of Sir David Attenborough and more recently we have written a persuasive letter to the stationery (who have been on strike due to their terrible treatment this term!)

In Reading we have been gripped by the book 'Holes' by Louis Sachar and have used this text to develop our retrieval and inference skills as well as our reading speed and expression.

Our recent maths unit has been on fractions, decimals and percentages and we have been able to make comparisons between the three. The children have worked incredibly hard in their assessments this half term in Reading and Maths and should be very proud of their achievements so far this year!







YEAR 6 THIS TERM

We have had an amazing term in Year 6! We have continued on with our exciting learning and are making loads of progress. In Maths, we have worked through equivalent fractions, decimals and percentages; perimeter, area and volume; and shape and angles. We have been doing lots of extra arithmetic practice each day to help us prepare for our SATS and we are really seeing lots of improvement. We have finished our book **The Boy in the Tower by Polly Ho-Yen** and are focusing on different types of texts in reading including poems, newspaper reports and non-chronological reports. In writing, we are focusing on our grammar skills and are applying them when writing different texts including letters, poems and narratives. In Science, we are learning about electricity and learning to build circuits; we have explored what happens when you change the number of bulbs on a circuit and what happens if you change the voltage in a circuit. In History, we have begun learning about WWII. We had a very exciting opportunity where a resident of the White Plains Care Home visited our Year 6s to talk about her experiences growing up during the war - it was truly an experience that we will never forget. We also visited the local church (St. Peter and Paul's) to embed some of our RE learning about different religious institutions and we met some wonderful women from the community who answered our questions and showed us around!



YEAR 6 THIS TERM

JUNIOR CITIZENS

On Tuesday, 19th March the Year 6 pupils took the bus to Brunel University to attend the Junior Citizenship programme. It was hosted by the London Fire Brigade and is an opportunity for the children to learn life skills that will help them transition to secondary school. Each group rotated through 8 exciting workshops, all surrounding important skills that will keep them safe and informed. The workshops were:

- Fire Safety
- Water Safety
- NHS: Harmful and safe substances
- Met Police: Knife Crime
- TFL: How to safely use busses and trains
- Bike Safety
- Online Safety
- Road Safety

We gained valuable skills and really enjoyed being on the Brunel University campus. Many of the presenters commented on how William Byrd students are the most well-behaved and engaged they have ever encountered.



FRENCH DAY

This term we had a whole school French day to help us learn not just the French language but also French culture as well. In Year 1 and 2 we learned how to say hello (Bonjour), my name is (Je m'apelle), goodbye (au revoir), and the numbers 0-10 in French.

In Year 3 and 4 we practiced how we would order food at a cafe and then had a French-style cafe in the school where we were served crepes, croissants, and pain au chocolates.

In Year 5 and 6 we learned about la fete des rois, a French festival! We made a traitional French cake Le galette des rois.



WORLD BOOK DAY 2024

We celebrate World Book Day every year, where our children and teachers come together to commemorate the joy of reading. On this day, children dress up as their favorite book characters and participate in various activities that encourage and inspire them to pick up a book and delve into the magical world of literature. Each year, our school engages in different reading-related activities, but the highlight of the day is when children and teachers share their favourite stories, fostering a love of reading among all.
